The protest's yield

On 17th September 2020, three acts collectively known as the farm laws were passed by the Indian Parliament. These three acts are called The Farmers' Produce Trade and Commerce (Promotion and Facilitation) Act, 2020; Essential Commodities (Amendment) Act, 2020; and Farmers (Empowerment and Protection) Agreement on Price Assurance and Farm Services Act, 2020.

laws have faced widespread opposition, especially the third act. It proposes that farmers can sell their produce to anyone, and removes the law that states they are only allowed to sell in state agricultural markets, or mandis. However, farmers are worried that this new law might cause government agencies to decrease their demand in these 'mandis' and farmers might have to work with private players. This leaves them vulnerable to exploitation and will also dismantle the MSP (Minimum Support Price) system which protects farmers from sharp price falls. The MSP is fixed for each crop every year, and is the price that the government procures crops at. Since November 2020, farmers have been camping around the outskirts of New Delhi, protesting these laws. They had been protesting for more than a year, with many rallies and tractor parades.

They have also marched towards Delhi and had blocked the NH9 railway.

Many farmers participated in "Rail Roko" Protests, where they attempted to stop trains from moving along their regular routes by sitting on the tracks. Protestors have often been dealt with brutality, and were met with water cannons and tear gas on some occasions. There was even a protest on 26th January, India's Republic Day which eventually turned violent and marked a dark day in the movement's history.

However, almost all farm leaders and protestors have since apologised, and called the incident appalling while renouncing the section that turned violent. On 19th November 2021, after a year of negotiations and protests, the Central Government announced that it would repeal the three farm laws. As the winter session of the Parliament begins, the official process to repeal these laws will be initiated. The Cabinet of Ministers has already cleared the repeal. This is a major win for the farming community and a hopeful end to a year-long protest.

COP26

The 26th Conference of the Parties (COP26) was conducted in Glasgow from 31st October to 12th November 2021. It was scheduled to be held in 2020 but was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Almost 200 countries participated in this climate summit. Their main aim was to set targets to reach net-zero emissions in order to stay below a 1.5-degree increase in average global temperatures. The failure of their plan would result in a loss in biodiversity and the collapse of entire ecosystems, while threatening human existence.

At first, COP26 seemed to be the climate summit that would save our planet. Environmentalists were hopeful that the required rapid action would be taken. However, after the conference, experts have conflicting judgements. COP26 was successful in several ways. The Glasgow Climate Pact had 197 signatories. 120 countries, consisting of 90% of the world's forests, vowed that by 2030, they would protect and reverse deforestation. 100 countries have promised to cut down methane emissions by 30% by 2030. The environmental impact of this greenhouse gas is 80 times more detrimental than Carbon Dioxide. The USA and China also agreed to cooperate and collaborate to combat climate change. Countries agreed on halting fossil fuel subsidies.

The 2009 Copenhagen Climate Summit had promised \$100 billion per year to developing nations so that they could fund their transition to renewable energy. However, this goal was not attained. A new target has been set. Developing nations will receive a total of \$500 billion from developed countries in the next five years. The 'Glasgow Finance Alliance for Net Zero' has been formed, which will collect \$130 trillion to combat environmental change.

When the terms of the Glasgow Pact had almost been decided, countries such as India and China interrupted. They insisted that rather than 'phasing out' coal, it should be 'phased down'. After much debate, the terms were modified. Several countries such as the Marshall Islands expressed disappointment at this decision. The exact implication of 'phasedown' is unknown. This may cause a problem in reaching the 1.5 degrees target. Alok Sharma, the President of COP26, apologized 'for the way this process had unfolded'. COP27 will be held in Egypt in 2022, where countries will further discuss their climate targets.

The Hubble Space Telescope

These are some of the most influential inventions in the 90's that changed the way we look at the world.

The World Wide Web (WWW) was invented in the year 1989 and launched on Christmas Eve by British scientist Tim Berners-Lee at CERN. Berners-Lee wrote the first proposal in March of 1989 and the second in May, 1990. Organizing global information using computers, data networks, and hypertext technologies was the basic idea behind the WWW.

address The first Web page was http://info.cern.ch/hypertext/WWW/TheProject .htmlThe page contained information about the WWW project, including a description of hypertext and instructions for building a Web server, as well as links to other Web servers. In 1991, Tim Berners-Lee finally released his WWW software. A critical point was that the web should remain an open standard to be used by all and not locked into proprietary systems. Today, we all know the WWW as an easily accessible information system, thanks to scientific developments made in the 90's.

In spite of its size and age, the Hubble Space Telescope is by far the best telescope created by humans. The idea of a telescope in space first originated in 1946, but it was launched only in 1990, by NASA in collaboration with the European Space Agency. Since then it has revolutionized astronomy with 1.4 million observations and 18,000 science papers on its findings. It has provided us with images of objects as close as the moon, to the remotest of all galaxies. Its position above the earth gives it an advantage over other telescopes as it does not have to deal with light pollution, rain clouds, weather phenomena and atmospheric distortions.

With the help of the Hubble Telescope, scientists now predict the age of the universe to be 13.75 billion years, as compared to the previous estimation of 10-20 billion years. The data sent in by the telescope, helped scientists realize the universe was expanding at an accelerated rate. Three people were also awarded the Nobel Prize for this discovery. Ever since its launch in 1990, this telescope is still a gold mine for space exploration.



The 1990's were an exciting decade in the field of sports. Along with breaking world records, setting new ones, and advancing as never before, the decade held some amazing moments for the world. From the Italia 90 to Tanni Grey-Thompson winning four gold medals in the Paralympics of 1992, we take a look at some of the most interesting sporting moments of the decade.

In 1994, West Indies and Warwickshire cricketer Brian Lara became arguably the greatest player in a match versus Durham at Edgbaston. He is acknowledged as the best batsman, with his record-breaking 501 not out. Interestingly, this global record would never have happened if bowler Anderson Cummins would not have stepped over the line while delivering a threatening stump yorker. It was ruled as a no ball, and Lara was only on twelve runs at the time. Statistically, he delivered 10 sixes, 427 deliveries, and 64 fours, shocking audiences around the globe. A miraculous feat, his record has not been matched over the course of 26 years.

In 1997, Tiger Woods had a string of victories under his belt, but a recordbreaking Masters victory cemented his status as the world's most recognised golfer. It was the 21-year-first old's major tournament victory, and his margin of victory -12 strokes over his competitors, was only surpassed by Old Tom Morris at the British Open 135 years earlier, when he won by 13 strokes. Woods' victory was indeed the greatest modern accomplishment Golf had ever seen! With this, he became the youngest golfer to win the Masters at the Augusta National Golf Club. It also made him overcome racial barriers as he emerged as the first man African to win a significant professional championship.







DIE HARD-





2. THE SECRET HISTORY BY DONNA TARTT-

With just the right kick of ginger and the aroma of warm spices, this is bound to get you in the right mood for Christmas! Make sure to have fun decorating your cookie with icing, sprinkles or whatever you please, making it a visual and gustatory delight!

FOR THE COOKIES-

- 1 ½ cups all purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- ½ cup dark brown sugar
- 5 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 1/3 cup honey
- ¾ teaspoon ginger powder
- ½ teaspoon cinnamon powder
- 1/4 teaspoon clove powder
- 1/4 teaspoon nutmeg powder
- 1/4 teaspoon cardamom powder

FOR THE ROYAL ICING-

- 4 tablespoon icing sugar
- 1 teaspoon corn flour
- 1 teaspoon milk

- Sift flour with baking powder and baking soda. Add salt, and all the spices and mix well. Keep aside.
- Add dark brown sugar and softened butter in a bowl and whisk until it turns soft and fluffy.
- Add honey and whisk again. Now add half the flour and fold until well combined. Add the second half of the flour and fold until all ingredients are well combined. The dough will be soft and smooth in texture. Wrap in a cling film and pop into the fridge for about an hour.
- Preheat the oven to 160 degrees Celsius. Take out the dough from the fridge and roll it into ¼ inch thick, cut shapes with a cookie cutter. Place them on a baking tray lined with parchment paper, keep them 3 inch apart. Freeze the cut cookies for 10 minutes.
- Now bake for 7-9 minutes. When cookies are done, remove and let it cool completely before you decorate them.
- This is optional but to make royal icing, mix all the ingredients mentioned under the list 'for royal icing'. Divide the icing into equal portions. Add required food colors and mix well. Put them into individual small piping bags and decorate the cookies. Let them sit for 20 to 30 minutes to dry.

Now, it's time to grab a plate of cookies, snuggle under a blanket and laugh with your family to your favourite Christmas movie! Don't forget to leave some out for Santa!



One of the most interesting pieces in the art of the 1990's, this artwork is inspired by a contemporary artist by the name of Laylah Ali, who made a series of paintings from 1996 to 2005 titled the 'Greenheads'. An undeniably captivating ideal, Ali used these 'Greenhead' characters, freeing them from categorical differences of gender, race, height, and age. She took her inspiration from events around the world, from protest signs to interactions of world leaders, but gave them a distinct sense of uniqueness and style of her own. The entire series draws from the world around Ali, giving them a socio-political meaning, yet interestingly making them creations which exist outside these confined realms. For this particular artwork, I used a digital medium to show the transition of technology in art, converting the paper painting into a form of pop art. Not only is this piece significant in terms of removing categorical differences between humans, but it delivers a much deeper essence of what truly defines our differences as individuals.

Keith Haring was one of the most widely celebrated artists of the 1990's, and his legacy still continues today. His vibrant, eye-catching, cartoon-like drawings might seem more simplistic than traditional artworks, but they are no less respected in the art world. His art, characterized by simple shapes, outlined with thick black lines but filled in with bright bold colours, took influence from the pop movement. His paintings reflect on a range of social and political movements, from love and humanity to apartheid in South Africa. The simple, faceless figures represent humans as unique but equal beings, despite gender, race, sexuality or religion. Haring wanted to emphasize the importance of individuality and how every human was different, always changing and important. Meanwhile the dancing figures clearly evoke joy, energy, fun and a sense of community.

Bengal Art

The 1990's were undoubtedly an age of modern expressionism in art. Bengal art flourished in this era, progressing forward since the colonial-impacted art. There was widespread creativity as both senior and junior artists started experimenting with new techniques in their creations.

Indian artists began to expand the range of forms they utilised in their work in the 1990's. Indian art began to bring new thoughts and work both within and outside of prior academic traditions during the country's economic liberalisation throughout that decade. Modern Indian art is often influenced by Western styles while incorporating Indian themes and images.

Devajyoti Ray, for example, pioneered a art known type of Pseudorealism, in which he used unusual colours and abstract shapes to show everyday events in Indian life. Akbar Padamsee is a contemporary Indian painter who works in a variety of mediums, including oil painting, plastic emulsion, water colour, sculpture, printmaking, and computer graphics. He's worked as a filmmaker, sculptor, photographer, engraver, and lithographer, among other things.

There are several notable Bengali artists from this decade, including Ganesh Pyne. Known for his "poetic surrealism", fantasy, and dark imagery, influenced by Bengali folklore and mythology, Pyne was one of the most notable contemporary artists of the Bengal School of Art. A leading artist during the post-Independence period of India's history, K G Subramanyan explored post-Independence Indian identity through art. As his works reflect a strong cubist influence, Subramanyan's paintings are known for their sensuality, nighty backdrops, and reflective faces. Subramanyan was awarded the Padma Vibhushan in 2012.

Indian and more specifically Bengal art flourished during this decade, leaving us with a rich history of art to reflect on and be inspired by.
